SUMMARY

At the start of the year, Re-Imagining New Communities laid out its plans for 2023 with a key focus on working with teachers, children, religious leaders, and other social change agents within urban settlements, specific rural communities in Kakamega, Vihiga, and Kitui counties to support them in developing practical strategies and collaborations aimed at shaping the conversation around their livelihoods, peace, and social issues.

Specifically, this year we are deliberate in ensuring that we provide safe spaces for individuals and organizations to share their experiences and core issues within their communities and workspaces.

This is achieved through:



Building the resilience of children and entities working with children.

Providing safe spaces that allow sharing of conflict and other struggles among community members.

Carry out impactfully tailored training and learning for individuals and organizations to build their capacity in peacebuilding and conflict resolution.



Therefore, this five-month report is a reflection of what the organization has done between January and June 2023.

The first half of the year provided an opportunity for Re-Imagining New Communities to firm up its programs and focus areas as well as build a reliable community of peacebuilders, advocates, and like-minded individuals and organizations.

SO, WHAT HAVE WE DONE SO FAR?

a) TEENS4PEACE

To kickstart the year, Re-Imagining New Communities facilitated a one-day peacebuilding and conflict resolution training for teenage footballers from Dandora- an informal settlement in Nairobi. The training was held on 20th January 2023 at Maono Africa Center For Transformation and lasted for two hours.

Why the training: This intervention was informed by the recent incidences of teenagers (13-17 years old) engaging in criminal activities like mugging, robbery, and other acts of cruelty within the community. Reportedly, these teenagers are mostly young footballers. One key incident is of a 16-year-old boy (name withheld) who died from mob justice after he mugged and stabbed a resident in his neighborhood.

Cases of teenagers involved in criminal activities are on the rise across Nairobi County, late last year a teenage girl was arrested in connection with a series of robberies in Langata, Nairobi. The 16-year-old student was tracked by detectives to her parent's house after area residents raised the alarm that there was a group of young men robbing pedestrians within the High-Rise area (Nairobi New September 22nd, 2022). Another 16-year-old teenager was arraigned at Kibera law courts alongside four adults on charges of robbery with violence charges.

For years, Dandora has been synonymous with organized crime and insecurity. Although there are many good initiatives that seek to transform the community into a safe hub, the continuous cases of criminal activities portray this area as a pestilent place for anyone.

The objective of the training - The training was aimed at providing basic skills for the teenagers to analyze and learn how to resolve conflict nonviolently.



The training brought together fifteen footballers from the Zuka football club- one of the football teams that support children within Dandora.

The training started with an exercise called "Who I Am"- This exercise entails the participants sharing about themselves and a description of their neighbourhood through drawing. One of the key highlights from the participants' drawing is a depiction of insecure neighbourhoods and on the flipside availability of informal playing grounds.

Further, the participants explored the meaning of conflict and where they have witnessed conflict in their lives. This session invited participants to think of personal experiences of conflict. Collectively, participants looked at the impact of these experiences on their lives and how they can respond differently in those cases. Some of the other areas covered were contributors to conflict and taking personal actions.

The training ended with participants committing to putting into practice what they had learned and participating in the second phase of the training.

b) FAITH4PEACE

In partnership with the Grace College of East Africa, Re-Imagining New Communities facilitated a two-day training workshop for pastors and church leaders drawn from 16 churches working in Kajiado, Nairobi, and Kisumu.

The training workshop was intended to support and build on the past experiences of religious leaders in shaping conversations around peacebuilding, leadership, and self-care. More specifically, the objectives of the workshop were to:

- 1. Deepen the pastors' understanding of their critical role in creating adequate space for conflict resolution.
- 2. Provide a shared understanding of the linkage between effective leadership, purpose, and building sustainable systems for churches.
- 3. Strengthen pastors' skills in storytelling, detecting conflict at an early stage, and designing solutions for their churches and communities.
- 4. Help the pastors learn from experiences of successful and unsuccessful practices dealing with conflict in the church, workplace, home, and communities.

Some of the topics covered in the workshop include self-awareness, storytelling, communication skills, leadership, conflict resolution, and church management.

c) CHILDREN-LED COMMUNITY PEACE LABS

The second cohort of CLCP-Labs was held between the 25th-28th of April and brought 10 together primary school teachers from Vihiga and Kakamega counties. The training program was sponsored by We One Action Network, a USA-based organization working in Kenya. The three-day program was hosted by Inua Village to Global Foundation's Village to Global Achievers School, one of their schools in the Emuhaya sub-county, Vihiga County.

Prior to the learning workshop, we had a laid-out plan to engage the participating schools. This included;

- 1. Early school recruitment; recruitment of schools started at the beginning of March. This gave the recruiting team ample time to send out invitation letters and follow-ups. This process enabled the schools to nominate teachers who would participate in the learning workshop.
- 2. Meeting with education officials within the two counties. We held familiarization meetings with various departments of education in Kakamega and Vihiga. This was an opportunity for us to get to know the education sector as well as introduce our work to the Ministry of Education.

April's learning workshop focused on introducing participating teachers to peacebuilding, conflict management, and effective ways to work with children and how to develop sustainable relationships with fellow teachers, parents, pupils, and other stakeholders within their communities.

This workshop is designed to build the resilience of teachers through;

- 1. Increasing the teachers' capacity and understanding to facilitate peacebuilding activities for their learners, fellow teachers, and schools.
- 2. Creating spaces for teachers and children to share their experiences of violence or conflict through play, music, drawing or any other means comfortable to them.
- 3. Increasing the resilience of participating teachers and children by providing positive role models and mentors.

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d) **COMMUNITY DIALOGUES**

On 5th May, Re-Imagining New Communities held a community dialogue with the residents of Kyatune Location, Mutomo subcounty in Kitui County. This dialogue was preceded by a series of meetings with the senior chief and community members.

The community dialogue held at the senior chief's camp in Mutomo brought together 15 key stakeholders from the community including four assistant chiefs, village administrators, community health workers, a community development officer, women group representative, youth representative, village elders, and faith leaders with an aim of discussing how they can solve some of the underlying issues affecting their community. The





leaders discussed common challenges facing their various localities, possible solutions, and what needs to be done to achieve the latter.

The key highlight was the need for capacity building and raising awareness on pertinent issues.

The key challenge facing Kyatune Location as identified and verified by the leaders is **substance abuse**. Other challenges include; Water, Gender-based violence, Violence against children, Food insecurity, Health, Unemployment, and Poverty.

These challenges also showed that there was a need for the community to collaborate with existing organizations in the community to mitigate some of the challenges and the essence of meaningful engagements build the capacity of the leaders to bring sustainable solutions in their community.
